

Anthropology (ANT)

ANT 301 Biological Anthropology 3 Hours

Introduction to the principles and the methods of biological (physical) anthropology. Overview of the study of human beings in an evolutionary context, our relationship to other primates, and to the rest of the natural world. Examines anatomical, behavioral, and genetic similarities and differences among living primates and basic mechanisms of the evolutionary process.

ANT 302 Cultural Anthropology 3 Hours

The concept of culture; social and political organization; language; the supernatural; elementary cultural theory.

ANT 302H Cultural Anthropology: Honors 3 Hours

Explore the concept of culture, social and political organization, language, the supernatural, and elementary cultural theory.

ANT 304 Introduction to Archaeological Studies: Prehistoric Archaeology 3 Hours

Anthropological study of prehistory, from human beginnings to the appearance of written records.

ANT 304T Introduction to Texas Archaeology 3 Hours

Introduces students to Texas archaeology through lectures, interactive virtual labs, and hands-on laboratory sections that emphasize experimentation.

ANT 305 Expressive Culture 3 Hours

How cultural assumptions affect how we tell and respond to different kinds of stories, including fairy tales, movies, and televised news.

ANT 307 Culture and Communication 3 Hours

An introduction to the study of culture through communication and the theory of signs.

ANT 310C Primate Cognition 3 Hours

Introduction to non-human primate knowledge of the physical world, as well as primate social knowledge. Examines non-human primate cognition within an evolutionary and comparative framework, with emphasis placed on comparing and contrasting non-human primate cognition with that of humans and other taxonomic groups.

ANT 310D Introduction to Black Studies 3 Hours

Introduction to canonical black studies literature, themes, and theories.

ANT 310F African Diaspora Archaeology 3 Hours

ANT 310G Ethics of Space Exploration 3 Hours

Examine cultural and ethical questions related to the exploration of space and the emerging field of astrobiology.

ANT 310I Early Mesoamerican Religions 3 Hours

Introduction to the study of indigenous religions in Mesoamerica, a geographic and cultural area spanning north-central Mexico through western Honduras, from approximately 250 BC - AD 1700. Examine the role of religion and ritual in daily life, as well as the lines of evidence available today for understanding them.

ANT 310J The New Latinas/os/xs 3 Hours

Explore the trajectories of various communities many have called the new Latinas/os/xs by identifying how race, gender, sexuality, class, indigeneity, language, migration, and geography influence the lives, identities, and sociopolitical incorporation of new Latinas/os/xs.

ANT 310L Introductory Topics in Anthropology 3 Hours

ANT 310L.2 Anthropology of Race and Ethnicity: An Introduction 3 Hours

Examines the social importance of race and ethnicity both in America and around the world.

ANT 310L.3 Anthropology of Latin America 3 Hours

Provides a framework for understanding contemporary concerns in Latin America.

ANT 310L.5 Introduction to South Asia 3 Hours

Introduction to Indian and south Asian civilization, past and present, including religion, literature, arts, philosophy, and history.

ANT 310L.6 Black Queer Art Worlds 3 Hours

Exploration of over two decades of work produced by and about black queer subjects throughout the circum-Atlantic world. Provides an introduction to various artists and intellectuals of the black queer diaspora, as well as an examination of the viability of black queer aesthetic practice as a form of theorizing.

ANT 310L.7 Diaspora: Race, Nation, and Resistance 3 Hours

Subjects include makings and meanings of diaspora, the differences and similarities between diaspora and related concepts such as race, nation, and cultural identity. Focuses on the making of the black Atlantic world, and comparative analysis between black diasporic life and that of other global dispersals, particularly among Asian and indigenous populations, and how resistance serves as a key link.

ANT 310M Mexican American and Latina/o Folklore Across the United States 3 Hours

ANT 310R Race, Sex, and Tourism 3 Hours

ANT 311D Introduction to Jewish Studies 3 Hours

ANT 311E Introduction to Jewish Latin America 3 Hours

Historical and cultural analysis of how Jews constructed lives and communities in predominantly Hispanic, Catholic countries of Latin America.

ANT 314C Introduction to Mesoamerican Archaeology 3 Hours

Introduction to ancient Mesoamerica from the time of emerging social inequality in the formative period until the Spanish conquest of Mexico-Tenochtitlan in the sixteenth century.

ANT 318L Mexican American Culture 3 Hours

Mexican American cultural distinctiveness in the areas of social organization, child rearing, food culture, folklore, language, and religion.

ANT 119S, 219S, 319S, 419S, 519S, 619S, 719S, 819S, 919S Topics in Anthropology 1-9 Hours

This course is used to record credit the student earns while enrolled at another institution in a program administered by the University's Study Abroad Office. Credit is recorded as assigned by the study abroad adviser in the Department of Anthropology. University credit is awarded for work in an exchange program; it may be counted as coursework taken in residence. Transfer credit is awarded for work in an affiliated studies program.

ANT 320C American Indian Languages and Cultures 3 Hours

Explore the myriad of indigenous languages of North America and how they are intertwined with culture.

ANT 320D Speech Play and Verbal Art 3 Hours

Examine speech play and verbal art (from puns to lies to songs to stories to poetry) from ethnographic and linguistic perspectives in a host of contexts and languages.

ANT 320E Invented Languages 3 Hours

Examine invented languages from pidgin and creole languages to Esperanto or Basic English, and contemporary "conlangs" associated with various science fiction and fantasy series.

ANT 320F Politics, Polity, and the Power of Words 3 Hours

Examine the place of language in a variety of different political settings—from oblique oratory in small-scale egalitarian communities to ritual "poetry" in cosmic polities to procedural prose in mass bureaucratic states—to illustrate the power of words. Identify the varied ways language sustains and transforms power relations in different political contexts, and thereby takes on a power of its own. Explore a variety of political situations, different modes of political communication, as well as different theories of the "performative" power of words.

ANT 320G Endangered Languages 3 Hours

Examine language rights as a tool for defending small-scale and minority language communities against the spread of national and global languages.

ANT 320I Talk, Text, and God 3 Hours

Introduction to the anthropological study of Christianity, particularly in colonial and post-colonial settings.

ANT 320O New Media and Communication 3 Hours

Explore anthropological and media studies analyses of technological changes in communications from the nineteenth through the twenty-first centuries.

ANT 320P Classical Archaeology: Practice and Ethics 3 Hours

Explore an overview of the history, methods, approaches, and ethics of classical archaeology focusing on case studies of major sites and their excavations.

ANT 321C Communicating with Non-Humans 3 Hours

Examine the continuities and transformations in how people have tried to talk to nonhumans in different cultural contexts, whether those be gods, animals, the dead, or machines.

ANT 321P The Politics of Insult 3 Hours

Examine how linguistic practices of (im)politeness and verbal aggression shape—and are shaped by—social hierarchies, cultural contexts, and political dynamics across different contexts, from liberal to anti-liberal. Analyze how seemingly neutral concepts of "civility" and appropriate speech" often mask power relations while exploring how taboo language, conflict talk, and transgressive communication can both challenge and reinforce existing social orders.

ANT 322C Contemporary African Popular Culture 3 Hours

ANT 322D Multicultural Israel 3 Hours

Examines the complex social fabric that comprises contemporary Israeli society, and that shapes Israeli identity, practice and politics.

ANT 322E Self and Culture in North Korea 3 Hours

Aims to understand North Korea's historical development and its current workings as a social, cultural, and political/ideological system.

ANT 322F Big Asian Histories 3 Hours

Examines ways in which Asia and other areas of the globe have had connected intellectual, artistic, and social developments with focus on world histories centrally involving Asia from the medieval period to the present.

ANT 322G Cultural Geographies of Israel 3 Hours

Examines critical spatial theory, landscape phenomenology, histories of Zionist architecture and urban planning as applied to Israel from the Yishuv period to the present.

ANT 322I Native American Cultures of the Southwest 3 Hours

Explore the diverse Native cultures of the Southwest, focusing on the philosophical underpinnings and the frameworks of meaning and moral responsibility of indigenous peoples of the American Southwest.

ANT 322J Goddesses in World Religions and Cultures 3 Hours

Historical and cross-cultural overview of the relationship between feminine and religious cultural expressions through comparative examinations and analyses of various goddess figures in world religions.

ANT 322N History of Hindu Religious Traditions 3 Hours

History of major doctrines, practices, and institutions that shaped the development of Hinduism; how religions adapt to social and cultural change and often provide the catalyst for change.

ANT 322O Gender, Sexuality, and the Family in Indian Religions and Cultures 3 Hours

A comprehensive historical overview of gender issues as they are represented in the textual traditions of South Asia.

ANT 322P Mexican Immigration Cultural History 3 Hours

Examines the history of Mexican immigration to the United States, and provides an overview of migratory patterns dating back to the late prehistoric period through contemporary times.

ANT 322Q Mexican American Indigenous Heritage 3 Hours

The prehistory, history, and contemporary racial understanding of Mexican Americans.

ANT 322T Russian Myths and Folktales 3 Hours

Examination of the Russian folktale, its roots in ancient, pre-Christian Slavic religious tradition, its connections with other forms of folklore such as myth and legend, and its transformation in modern Russian literature. Subjects include the continuing influence of folklore explored through various aspects of Russian culture, including literature, music, ballet, film, and popular culture.

ANT 322U Anthropology of Travel and Tourism 3 Hours

Use the tools of cultural anthropology to understand the touristic encounter and the increasing (and decreasing) accessibility of travel and mobility.

ANT 322V Architecture and Sculpture in the Maya World 3 Hours

Explore the ancient world of the Maya through the lens of architecture and sculpture.

ANT 322W Power and Resistance in Putin's Russia 3 Hours

Introduction to Russian political and protest cultures—beyond the headlines and outside the Kremlin walls.

ANT 323C Sport, Religion, and Society 3 Hours

Explore sport as it relates to ritual and religious practice and examine the meaning and nature of sport in cross-cultural perspectives.

ANT 323D Religions of the Caribbean 3 Hours

Examine the histories and politics of religious practices in the Greater Caribbean, encompassing the islands and Central American coasts as well as the continental diasporas, from Vodou and Rastafari to popular Hinduism.

ANT 323E Politics and Performance 3 Hours

Consider the power struggles of the democratic process by closely attending to language, rhetoric and performance.

ANT 323I Comparative White Nationalisms 3 Hours

Consider critical questions about the constructions of whiteness and nationalism across the globe. Examine, through an anthropological lens, how the boundaries of whiteness changed throughout history, and its relationship to far-right political groups, to trace the history of white nationalism and its present-day global resurgence.

ANT 323N Biomedicine, Ethics, and Culture 3 Hours

Examines ethical questions such as the allocation of medical resources, stem cell research and cloning, organ transplantation, abortion, human experimentation, prolonging life and the right to die, suicide, euthanasia, and diagnosis and treatment of illnesses, explored from a global perspective.

ANT 323O Black Geographies 3 Hours

Explore the relationship between Blackness and the production of space and place. Examine the tensions and possibilities that emerge when Black people are rendered un-geographic as a fundamental component of racial capitalism while they are simultaneously creating spaces of freedom under constant threats to Black life.

ANT 323P Anthropology of the Himalayas 3 Hours

Examine the history and culture of the Himalayan region, including Northeast India, sections of Pakistan and Afghanistan, Tibet, and especially Nepal.

ANT 323Q Contemporary Jerusalem 3 Hours

Explore what life is like in today's contested, rapidly growing, and increasingly diverse Jerusalem.

ANT 323R Anthropology of Infrastructure 3 Hours

Explore how infrastructure creates relationships between resources, energy, built form, information, and people.

ANT 323S Anthropology of Food 3 Hours

Explore the cultural dimensions of growing, cooking, and eating food by engaging themes of gender, race, indigeneity, embodiment, hunger, and power.

ANT 323T Colonial Encounters in Mesoamerica 3 Hours

Study European-indigenous encounters in Mesoamerica, a geographic and cultural area spanning north-central Mexico through western Honduras, between approximately 1450-1750. Examine strategies of contact, accommodation, and resistance that indigenous communities and European colonizers used to communicate with each other and negotiate the conduct of daily life in colonial society.

ANT 323U Sensing: Elemental Media 3 Hours

Explore a sensory ethnographic investigation of urban ecology, organized around air, water, earth, and fire as themes for engaging with the city through media and the senses.

ANT 323V Maya Art and Architecture 3 Hours

Introduction to the artistic traditions of the ancient Maya, tracing their development up to the time of European contact. Students will examine various important themes of Maya culture including history, ritual, and cosmology as revealed in sculpture, hieroglyphs, painting, and architectural design.

ANT 323W Race and Indigeneity in the Pacific 3 Hours

Examine a multidisciplinary study of sovereignty, settler colonialism, diaspora, and migration in the Pacific.

ANT 324C Science, Magic, and Religion 3 Hours

Historical and cross-cultural overview of the constructed concepts of magic, science, and religion through comparative examinations of cultural contexts from the Islamic world, western Europe, the Caribbean, the U.S., and Mozambique.

ANT 324D Japanese Religion and Western Imagination 3 Hours

Examines Japanese religious traditions, with a focus on Zen, through the perspective of people living in non-Japanese societies since the end of World War II. Explores different ways in which non-Japanese have imagined Japanese religious and ethical ideas and both explained Japanese behavior and adopted ideas about Japan into their writings about philosophy and life.

ANT 324E Culture and Health 3 Hours

Examine the social and cultural foundations of western medicine as well as an introduction to indigenous and alternative health systems.

ANT 324F Anthropology Of Religion 3 Hours

Examine a genealogy of the anthropology of religion around the globe from the nineteenth century to the present.

ANT 324G Environmental Anthropology 3 Hours

Examine the environment, environmental inequality, and the relationship between culture and ecology.

ANT 324I Sounding the City 3 Hours

Explore the significance of sound for urban social life.

ANT 324J HIV and AIDS Activism and the Healing Arts 3 Hours

ANT 324L Topics in Anthropology 3 Hours

ANT 324L.13 Musics of India 3 Hours

Explore the musical traditions of India, with emphasis on Hindustani and Carnatic musical styles, but including examination of other traditions.

ANT 324L.17 Nature, Society, and Adaptation 3 Hours

Long term trajectories of change in human environment relationships, including issues of human evolution and human nature, violence, population, food, agriculture, urbanization, globalizing modernization, and environmental impacts; issues of sustainability, cultural survival, human rights, and environmental protection.

ANT 324L.24 Archaeology of African Thought 3 Hours

Archaeological, historical, and ethnographic data as they relate to the foundations of contemporary African and African American societies.

ANT 324L.3 Primitive Technology 3 Hours

ANT 324L.31 Development And Its Critics 3 Hours

Discuss aspects of the contemporary international aid and development in Asia and beyond. Examine the decision-making within the development industry and the scope of aid as a economic and social force in the contemporary world.

ANT 324L.33 Geographical Information Systems and Remote Sensing for Archaeology and Paleontology 3 Hours

Designed to give students interested in the fields of archaeology, physical anthropology, and paleontology a foundation in the use of geographical information systems (GIS) and the analysis of remotely sensed data from satellites and aerial photographs.

ANT 324L.39 Theories of Archaeology 3 Hours

The history of archaeological thought, including the major theoretical trends that have shaped the discipline over time.

ANT 324L.41 Science, Technology, and Race 3 Hours

Examines the intersections and linkages between race, science, and technology. Review of the array of current anthropological and sociological studies of science, which regard science as an institutionalized set of cultural practices charged with generating objective knowledge of the world.

ANT 324L.42 United States Latino and Latina Ethnographies 3 Hours

Explores past and present anthropological representations of Latinos and Latinas in the United States.

ANT 324L.43 Creative Nonfiction and Ethnography 3 Hours

Explores the convergences and divergences between ethnographic and narrative journalistic writing, and their potential for producing powerful, richly textured accounts that capture the depth of human experience and the complexity of social life.

ANT 324L.44 Ethnographic Theory and Practice 3 Hours

An exploration of the complex relationship between anthropological ideas and ethnographic practice. Introduces a broad spectrum of concepts, issues, and theories of culture, and critically examines how these theories and ideas shape anthropological methods and writings.

ANT 324L.45 Queer Ethnographies 3 Hours

Anthropological analysis of gender and sexuality that critically evaluates formative concepts and theories that have been subject to recent debates within anthropology, gender studies, and queer theory.

ANT 324L.46 Urban Unrest 3 Hours

Analysis of the roots of urban unrest, exploring a range of origins: joblessness, state violence, white flight, backlash against civil rights gains, new immigration, and interracial strife. Beyond race and class, subjects include exploring unrest as a mode of pushing the normative boundaries of gender and sexuality in public space. Course material will draw from film, literature, history, geography, and anthropology.

ANT 324L.48 Sex and Power in the African Diaspora 3 Hours

Exploration of various experiences and theories of sex, intimacy, and desire alongside intellectual and artistic engagements with power hierarchies and spirituality across transnational black communities. Subjects include the concept of "erotic subjectivity" from various theoretical and methodological angles, principally within African diasporic contexts.

ANT 324L.49 Global Markets and Local Cultures 3 Hours

Examine contemporary theories of globalization, including materials exploring global governance, international monetary policy, migration regulation, offshoring, and cultural hybridity. Focus on case studies in Asia and elsewhere that reveal how these practices impact particular communities.

ANT 324L.51 The Cities of the Middle East 3 Hours

Anthropological and sociological analysis of space, with a special emphasis on urban theory and culture in the Middle East.

ANT 324L.53 Global Indigenous Issues 3 Hours

Explores contemporary issues of indigenous peoples around the world through films, literature, and social science readings and focuses on how indigenous peoples are actively working to oppose their oppression and create sustainable futures.

ANT 324L.54 Black Native American Relations in the United States 3 Hours

Explores the entwined histories, cultures, and identities of African American and Native American people in North America. Subjects include experiences of racial formation, including how race, power, and indigeneity work in different ways for people in contemporary United States society.

ANT 324L.56 Ethnographic Writing 3 Hours

Writing workshop consisting of a series of exercises to add density and texture to ethnographic description by including attention to scene, character, event, situation, and dialogue.

ANT 324L.57 Archaeology of Climate Change 3 Hours

Examines why climate changes, the methods for recording climate change, and includes case studies of the varied responses of past human societies to climate change in different geographic regions and time periods with varying socio-political and economic systems.

ANT 324L.58 Digital Data Systems in Archaeology 3 Hours

Designed to help students understand the basic knowledge and skills needed to operate digital equipment (e.g. GPS and Total Data Stations) commonly used for collecting location data on archaeological sites. Instruction on mapping and grid systems translates into "hands-on" instrument operation in simulated archaeological field conditions. Provides an introduction to GIS software and its applications in archaeology as well as an overview of near-surface sensing techniques.

ANT 324L.59 Graffiti and Poster Art in the Islamic World 3 Hours

ANT 324L.63 Food and Culture 3 Hours

Examines cultural and linguistic views on eating and how we talk about what we eat in the contemporary era. Combines scholarly literature, videos, and readings about food subjects that circulate in popular culture, and considers how flows of dietary images and discourses shape race/ethnicity, gender, social class, and other identifications.

ANT 324L.64 The Bronze Age and the Iron Age in Atlantic Europe 3 Hours

Introduction to the archaeology of Atlantic Europe with particular emphasis on the Bronze Age and Iron Age periods. Examines the diversity and commonalities of European adaptations, investigates how geography influenced trade of goods and ideas, as well as the profound changes brought about by a new conceptualization of the world and the innovations of the Bronze and Iron Ages.

ANT 324L.65 Anthropology for Liberation 3 Hours

Takes a critical look at anthropologists' quests to shifting the legacy of anthropology from the colonial toward freedom and liberation. Explores anthropology's relationship to human rights, violence, questions of race, gender, and sexuality, imperialism and neoliberalism, and the ways that some anthropologists have chosen to use their field work in new and different ways.

ANT 324L.66 Indigenizing Queer Theory 3 Hours

Introduction to emerging work by indigenous queer theorists, largely from the United States. Examines cultural conflicts between the west and indigenous world views and practices surrounding monogamy and marriage, same-sex marriage, enforced gender binaries, sexual identities and practices, their regulation by the colonial state, and implications for indigenous people.

ANT 324L.68 Creation and Evolution: Human Origins in Scientific and Religious Discourses 3 Hours

Examines evolutionary theory, intelligent design, and creationism, and how they interact.

ANT 324L.69 Japanese Concepts of Body and Self 3 Hours

Exploration of anthropological literature describing Japanese conceptions of self and body, and analysis of the intersection of these conceptions of self with Japanese ideas about religion, morality, aging, and medicine.

ANT 324L.7 Introduction to African Prehistory 3 Hours

ANT 324L.71 Extraterrestrial Intelligence: Culture, Religion, and Imagination 3 Hours

Focusing primarily on the 20th and 21st Centuries, explores the search for extraterrestrial intelligence (SETI) and considers how these ideas have intersected with other aspects of society, particularly religion, including recent arguments that SETI itself has developed into a religion. Examines meanings and motivations behind issues such as Percival Lowell's quest to prove the existence of canals on Mars and the development of Scientology.

ANT 324L.72 Development, Security, and Society 3 Hours

Explores the linkages between development, security, and society. Examines a series of recent transformations that have drawn the relationship between international development and various forms of security together. Through an exploration of recent anthropological work, examines subjects such as: human security, the relationship between development and humanitarian intervention, strategies for planning in the face of climate change, disaster management, and new technologies of warfare and security.

ANT 324L.73 Political Ecology 3 Hours

Introduction to core tenets of political ecology. Focuses on ethnographic approaches and introduces key debates in the field—such as the relationship between environment and violence, the critique of Malthusian and neo-Malthusian notions of scarcity and limits, the links between conservation and dispossession, and more. Explores the uses of political ecology in key contemporary debates over social and environmental change, from climate change to waste management.

ANT 324L.74 Inca World 3 Hours

Explores how Inca civilization developed, how the Incas grew from a small highland state into a mighty empire, and how a small number of Spaniards and their allies were able to bring the Inca dynasty to an end. Read accounts of the Incas written in the first years of Spanish colonial rule, and review the latest archaeological discoveries.

ANT 324L.75 Arab Latin Americas 3 Hours

Examine the ways in which Arab immigrant identities have been negotiated and co-opted socially, but also institutionally, in various countries in the Western Hemisphere.

ANT 324L.76 Indigenous Peoples of Russia and the USSR 3 Hours

Examine an introduction to theories of colonial critique and visual culture studies. Explore the history of the Indigenous peoples of the Eurasian north.

ANT 324L.77 Blacks and Asians: Race and Social Movements 3 Hours

Examines the relations between Asians and Blacks in the United States.

ANT 324L.78 Black Women and the State 3 Hours

Surveys black women's experiences living with and confronting state oppression around the world. Takes an historical, social, and theoretical look at the roots of this oppression and inequality, and how black women have chosen to respond to it locally and globally.

ANT 324L.8 Cultures of Southeast Asia 3 Hours

Comparative study of the peoples of Indonesia, Burma, Thailand, Malaysia, and other countries.

ANT 324L.9 The African Diaspora in the Americas 3 Hours

Black cultures and societies in the New World, and their African heritage.

ANT 324N Muslim Women in Politics 3 Hours

ANT 324O Globalization in Latin America 3 Hours

Critically examine the globalization phenomenon in Latin America, focusing on history and ethnography.

ANT 324P Gender and Labor in Global Asia 3 Hours

ANT 324Q Global Perspectives of Health, Illness, and Inequality 3 Hours

Use an anthropological framework to think critically and analytically about global past and contemporary issues in health. Examine the root causes of health, illness, and inequality.

ANT 324R Daily Life in Mesoamerica 3 Hours

Examine the daily life of people in Mesoamerica, from the earliest inhabitants in the region to the myriad ways that Precolumbian life and archaeology affect the lives of people today.

ANT 324S The Global City 3 Hours

ANT 324U Socialism's Past and Futures 3 Hours

Examine ordinary people's experience of socialism in the Soviet Union and the plural interpretations of this experience after the USSR's collapse.

ANT 324V Sexuality in Global Perspective 3 Hours

Explore the ways in which sexuality intersects with money, intimacy, power, and labor in the context of global economic processes.

ANT 324W Mapping Indigenous Austin 3 Hours

Explore the histories and presence of indigenous Austin.

ANT 325C Cultures of Sustainability 3 Hours

Examine how ecological concerns are articulated and perceived in different cultural contexts.

ANT 325D Representation of Jews in the American Public Sphere 3 Hours

Examines how Jews have been represented and constituted in American public culture as a race, religion, and/or nation through distinct institutions and display practices.

ANT 325E Ethnographies of Emotion 3 Hours

Examine concepts such as place, character, objects, subjects, cultural forms, everyday life, and feeling states or structures such as trauma, love, hope, depression, the even keel, and melodrama through a writing workshop. Explore how to articulate structures of feeling with models of culture and the self. Analyze and experiment with modes of ethnographic attention, the importance of telling detail, and methods of participant observation.

ANT 325F Cultural Heritage on Display 3 Hours

Explore the public construction and display of traditional American folk culture by studying popular folklife-oriented tourist sites.

ANT 325G Technoculture 3 Hours

Analyze social groups using digital methods and a process of self-reflection focused on technological mediations of experience.

ANT 325I Sonic Ethnography 3 Hours

Examine sound, themes of listening, noise, silence, audio technology, vibration, and voice.

ANT 325J The Photographic Image 3 Hours

Applies concepts and practices from visual ethnography to the study of memory, place, and everyday life. Subjects include developing counterintuitive and subversive approaches to practices of looking and techniques of representation.

ANT 325O American Jewish Material Culture 3 Hours

Examines the interplay between material culture and Jewish identity and thought in contemporary America.

ANT 325P Abolition Medicine 3 Hours

Examine race-based diagnostics tools and treatment guidelines that reinforce antiquated and scientifically inaccurate notions of biological race. Discuss the upstream structures that enable downstream violence, such as police brutality. Analyze, through an abolitionist lens, various systems of power in medicine, culture, and society to trace the colonial logics, practices, and institutions in the afterlife of slavery pertaining to health, illness and disease, healthcare, and public health in the United States and globally.

ANT 325Q Practices of Looking 3 Hours

Explore the development of methodological and analytic tools for the examination of visual culture.

ANT 325R Cultures and Ecologies 3 Hours

Examines the anthropology of "nature" and "natural resources," with particular attention to the communities in the arctic and subarctic regions. Use ethnographies to learn about the cultures of peoples who inhabit northern latitudes, especially their cosmological modes of belief and their ecological ways of life.

ANT 325S Global Black Feminisms 3 Hours

Examine Black feminist theories and practices around the world from a transnational and comparative perspective.

ANT 325T Jewish Folklore 3 Hours

ANT 325U Austin Jews in the Civil Rights Era 3 Hours

ANT 325V Jewish Cuba 3 Hours

ANT 325W Shamanism and the Primitive 3 Hours

ANT 326C Native Americans in Texas 3 Hours

Studies the history of Native Americans in Texas using concepts and evidence from anthropology, history, archaeology, historical geography, and Native American studies.

ANT 326D Native Americans in the Plains 3 Hours

The ethnohistory of some of the most influential Native American groups on the plains, from the arrival of the Spanish through the reservation period.

ANT 326E Plains Archaeology: Prehistory and History 3 Hours
Explores the evidence of human activities on the central and southern plains from prehistoric to historical times (ca. 11,000 BC to ca. AD 1850).

ANT 326F Great Discoveries in Archaeology 3 Hours
The stories, myths, and people behind some of the great archaeological discoveries.

ANT 326G Europe Via Ethnography 3 Hours
Develop a geographical and historical orientation to Europe and examine the cultural complexity of Europe via ethnography.

ANT 326I Traveling Culture 3 Hours
Examine mobility as a point of inquiry into questions of identity, community, belonging, place and landscape, art, representation, cultural difference, experience, and history.

ANT 326J Historic Artifacts 3 Hours
Explore the archaeological process of identification and classification of historic artifacts.

ANT 326L Cultures in Contact 3 Hours
History of the interactions of the indigenous peoples of the Americas with Africans, Asians, and Europeans over the past five hundred years.

ANT 326M Sustainable Maya Geographies - Past to Future 3 Hours
Explore landscapes, conservation, and human-environment dynamics in the Maya region of Central America from more than 10,000 years ago to modern times. Compare sustainable practices from the past with those of indigenous Maya communities today to guide the future.

ANT 326N Cultural Resource Management 3 Hours
Explore a thorough overview of Cultural Resource Management (CRM). Designed for students who are interested in pursuing a career in archaeology.

ANT 326O Empires: Aztec and Spanish 3 Hours
Examine the daily life of people in the Mexica (commonly known as Aztec) empire after the Spanish conquest.

ANT 326P Historical Archaeology 3 Hours
Explore recent theoretical, methodological, and thematic developments in historical archaeology with particular focus in North America and the Caribbean.

ANT 326Q Archaeological Field and Lab Methods 3 Hours
Introduction to field and laboratory work in archaeology including survey, excavation, artifact processing and cataloging, and initial artifact or sample analysis.

ANT 326R Latina/o/x Citizenship 3 Hours
Explore the concepts of membership, belonging, immigration and citizenship in the Latina/o/x experience. Examine how historically, politically, socially and culturally, Latinas/os/xs have been construed as belonging or not belonging members of the United States society.

ANT 326S Mesoamerican History and Oral Tradition 3 Hours
Study Mesoamerican indigenous documents and oral traditions to reconstruct different aspects of the life and culture of the past and present populations of Mesoamerica. Apply a methodological approach to the study of indigenous primary sources from Mesoamerica, written during the Late Postclassic (c. 1200-1524 CE) and the beginning of the Colonial period, including oral tradition. Explore religion, socio-political organization, territory and territoriality, economy, gender roles, and the norms and values of everyday life.

ANT 326T Displacement and Resistance 3 Hours
Explore technologies of displacement, as well as tactics, digital media work, mapping projects, and activism that communities engage with to resist dispossession. Examine, locally and globally, the displacement and resistance effects of various events including infrastructure projects and gentrification.

ANT 327D Colonial Latin American Archaeology 3 Hours
Focuses on the Spanish colonies in Latin America.

ANT 327E Ethics in Anthropology 3 Hours
Explore the complex ethical challenges which arise when studying people, their communities, their languages, and their past. Engage with real-world case studies, ethical frameworks, and debates, flipping the anthropological gaze to focus on the anthropologist's behaviors and decisions.

ANT 327F Making Florida 3 Hours
Explore Florida archaeology from the earliest inhabitants to the present day. Focus on the experiences of Indigenous Floridians, the role played by Florida in the Atlantic Slave Trade, and the continuous but highly varied nature of immigration to and from the Sunshine State.

ANT 327M Animal Studies 3 Hours
Examine the broad spectrum of animal worlds, particularly as they intersect with human social activities. Analyze various interactions between humans and nonhumans in a variety of social settings.

ANT 327R Human Remains 3 Hours
Study samples of what people do with human remains to help understand belief systems, conceptions of death, rituals, and many other aspects of societies, past and present. Examine how anthropologists study human remains to learn about past societies, religion, politics, economics, diet, health, and other subjects. Learn ethical aspects of handling human remains.

ANT 327S Science and Society 3 Hours
Examine the ethical and social implications of scientific discoveries and technological advancements, especially as they have affected disenfranchised populations in the United States and internationally. Use civil discourse to mindfully explore difficult topics and develop intellectual, scientific, and ethical literacy.

ANT 328C Contemporary Issues in Native American and Indigenous Studies 3 Hours
Examine structures of settler colonialism and how indigenous peoples resist those structures.

ANT 328D Popular Culture and Indigenous Futurities 3 Hours
Examine indigenous creative practices within and in response to mainstream popular culture.

ANT 328E Decolonial Intersectionality 3 Hours
Examine the concept of intersectionality within feminist thinking to analyze gender, race, and indigeneity in the context of ongoing colonial formations.

ANT 328F Religion and Family in Japanese Society 3 Hours
Explores the structures of family, kinship, and religion in Japan since 1868 and their roles in the creation and expression of national and individual identities.

ANT 328G Coloniality in West Africa 3 Hours
Study the changes and continuities of socio-political categories in African contexts from the period of formal colonial rule to the present day.

ANT 328I Expressive Arts of Global Africa 3 Hours
Explore music, dance, and other artistic forms as modes of political expression and community building.

ANT 328J Native Food Sovereignty 3 Hours
Explore a comparative approach to understanding how and why food is a central component of contemporary sovereignty discourse.

ANT 328N Culture, Medicine, and Society in Asia 3 Hours
Analyze health and illness as a lens for exploring Asian cultures and societies. Discuss themes, concepts, and approaches in anthropology to interrogate the interaction between culture, medicine, and society.

ANT 329K Transnational Korea 3 Hours

Recent and contemporary manifestations of the Koreans in the world and the world in the Koreans. Subjects include labor and marriage migration, educational sojourning, transnational adoption, tourism, international sport, corporate expatriation, and media flows.

ANT 129S, 229S, 329S, 429S, 529S, 629S, 729S, 829S, 929S Topics in Anthropology 1-9 Hours

This course is used to record credit the student earns while enrolled at another institution in a program administered by the University's Study Abroad Office. Credit is recorded as assigned by the study abroad adviser in the Department of Anthropology. University credit is awarded for work in an exchange program; it may be counted as coursework taken in residence. Transfer credit is awarded for work in an affiliated studies program.

ANT 329V Native American Verbal Art 3 Hours

Examine the verbal artistic traditions such as jokes, story-telling, song, chant, poetry, etc., of Native American peoples.

ANT 330C Theories of Culture and Society 3 Hours

Examination of the theoretical approaches that have established the intellectual foundations of contemporary sociocultural anthropology.

ANT 331C Archaeological Curation: Theory and Practice 3 Hours

Introduction to to curation and ethics in archaeology largely through hands-on training with various collections and archives housed at the Texas Archeological Research Laboratory (TARL).

ANT 432L Primate Anatomy 4 Hours

Comparative and functional anatomy of primates, including humans; emphasis on adaptations and evolution of the various taxa.

ANT 336L Native American Cultures North of Mexico 3 Hours

ANT 340C Ethnographic Research Methods 3 Hours

Introduction to methods used in conducting ethnographic research; emphasis on research design, analysis, writing, and ethical considerations.

ANT 344K Films: An Anthropological Perspective 3 Hours

Films viewed and discussed. How is cultural meaning communicated? What systems of signification are involved? What are possibilities and limitations of ethnographic films?

ANT 345C Urban Cultures 3 Hours

The culture of cities, including the distinctive forms of expressive culture, ethnic and racial conflict, and political or economic activity that cities generate.

ANT 345D The Anthropology of Disinformation and Conspiracy Theories 3 Hours

Develop an anthropological perspective on disinformation and conspiracy theories and examine how these phenomena are embedded in cultural, social, and political contexts. Explore the ways in which disinformation is constructed, disseminated, and maintained within different media ecologies.

ANT 345E Eastern Europe on American TV 3 Hours

Focus on ways Eastern Europe is depicted on American television screen. Use anthropological framework to study multiple types of television shows, including reality tv, network dramas, and miniseries. Analyze ethnic, racial, national, and gender representation and what these constructions tell us about the ways that Eastern Europe is imagined.

ANT 346L Primate Social Behavior 3 Hours

Studies primate behavior and why primates do what they do, including basic theoretical principles and the models used to explain primate behavior.

ANT 346M Comparative Primate Ecology 3 Hours

The basics of how organisms interact with their environment, focusing on a wide range of primates from a comparative perspective. Discusses how various aspects of ecology are used to conserve primate populations.

ANT 347C Methods in Primate Biology 3 Hours

The study of primate behavior and the methods by which animal behavior is observed and documented. Students conduct a research project and write a report.

ANT 348 Human Origins and Evolution 3 Hours

Detailed examination and analysis of morphological trends evident in the hominid fossil record.

ANT 348C Sex Violence Power 3 Hours

Explore the diversity of power relationships and structures across primates, the methods used to document and analyze them, and the theories for why they arise.

ANT 348E Environmental Epigenetics 3 Hours

Explore major subjects in anthropology, toxicology, and public health pertaining to the study of environmental exposures and disease/illness in the context of the current understanding of epigenetic processes. Analyze epigenetic mechanisms, gene transcription, the relationship between the environment and the epigenome, and epigenetics, health. Assess the main findings in the field and discuss their relevance to anthropology, public health, medicine, and in general.

ANT 348I Comparative Primate Development 3 Hours

Explore "life history theory" and how it pertains to the traits related to growth and reproduction, life, and death in primates.

ANT 348J Sex and Human Nature 3 Hours

Provides an introduction to the scientific study of sexual behavior, mate choice, and reproduction in humans from the perspective of evolutionary biology; examines a wide range of genetic, ecological, social, physiological, and behavioral aspects of human sexuality.

ANT 348K Current Topics in Biological Anthropology 3 Hours

An in-depth study of current topics, controversies, and literature on the evolution, morphology, genetics, and behavioral ecology of primates, including humans.

ANT 348K.10 Primate Conservation 3 Hours

The theory and practices of conservation biology as applied to primates. Explores species and community characteristics influencing extinction risk, current threats to primates, and potential conservation strategies.

ANT 348K.11 Early Hominid Evolution 3 Hours

Examines the early stages of human evolution in Africa starting from the last common great ape ancestor through the origin of the genus Homo, looking at the behavioral and morphological adaptations that characterize the earliest stages of human evolution.

ANT 348K.8 Evolutionary Anatomy of the Head and Neck 3 Hours

The comparative and functional anatomy of the head and neck in primates and other mammals.

ANT 348M Molecular Anthropology 3 Hours

Explore background information and gain hands-on experience with the molecular (DNA extraction, PCR, SNP genotyping) and bioinformatic (principal component analysis, admixture analysis) techniques commonly used in molecular anthropology.

ANT 348P Primates, Parasites, and Pathogens 3 Hours

Explore an overview of the major types of parasites and pathogens of primates and other mammals, their natural history, ecology, and population dynamics, and their role as selective agents on aspects of primate physiology, behavior, and sociality.

ANT 348R Race, Science, and Human Variation 3 Hours

Explore the patterns of biological variation within and between human populations, including variation in phenotypic, genetic, and behavioral traits. Consider both the microevolutionary and cultural processes that influence that variation. Examine how studies of human variation have impacted society in the past and present. Discuss human biological variation; the history of the concept of race and of eugenics/race science; fundamental principles of genetics and evolution; human genetic and biocultural adaptation; and contemporary issues in human genetics, health, and disease.

ANT 348S Social and Biological Networks 3 Hours

Introduction to thinking about, characterizing, and working with relational data in network formats (such as fundamentals of network science, social network analysis, and graph theory) and their applications in the study of social and biological systems.

ANT 349D Anthropological Genetics 3 Hours

Basic principles of molecular genetics and population genetics as they relate to the study of humans and other primates.

ANT 350C Primate Sensory Ecology 3 Hours

An integrated perspective on the comparative anatomy, physiology, and ecological significance of sensory adaptations in primates.

ANT 351E Primate Evolution 3 Hours

Examination of the fossil record for nonhuman primate evolution, including basic concepts of the anatomy, ecology, and systematics of living primates.

ANT 351G Language, Culture, and the Texas German Experience 3 Hours

The evolution of the culture and language of German immigrants to Texas from the 1840s through the present and how they have influenced other ethnic groups in Texas.

ANT 453 Archaeological Analysis 4 Hours

Derivation of chronology and cultural information from archaeological data; the role of archaeology in modern life.

ANT 353E Archaeological Laboratory Analysis 3 Hours

The analysis of artifacts, features, architecture, and other remains recovered in the field.

ANT 358F The Two Koreas and the United States 3 Hours

The political, social, and cultural relationship between North and South Korea, and between the Koreas and the United States, since 1945.

ANT 358Q Supervised Research 3 Hours

ANT 360K The Civilization of the Maya 3 Hours

Maya prehistory and history: the archaeological record, codices and inscriptions, and Spanish conquest writings.

ANT 361L Maya Studies: Past, Present, and Future 3 Hours

Explore the long history and cultural development of Maya peoples from Mexico and Central America, ranging from the earliest occupation of the Maya territory to the present. Explore several fields of the Maya population, including sociopolitical organization, technology, economy, religion, spirituality, genocides, cultural revitalization, and artistic expressions.

ANT 361M Maya Collapse 3 Hours

Explore different aspects of Classic Maya daily life, their relationship with the environment, and the factors that influenced the transformation of the Maya civilization at the end of the Classic period.

ANT 662 Field Archaeology 6 Hours

ANT 362K Archaeology of Texas and Vicinity 3 Hours

Cultural history of Texas and neighboring areas, from early prehistoric times to Anglo-American settlements.

ANT 462M Archaeological Techniques 4 Hours

Problems in planning, organizing, and carrying out archaeological surveys and excavations.

ANT 366 Anatomy and Biology of the Human Skeleton 3 Hours

Comprehensive study of the human skeleton, with special attention to methods of identification.

ANT 366D Bones: Advanced Identification and Analysis of the Mammalian Skeleton 3 Hours

Focus on the applied study of the skeleton in humans and other mammals and the methods of analysis used in biological anthropology, forensic anthropology, bioarchaeology, and zooarchaeology.

ANT 373F Historical Perspectives on the German Language 3 Hours

ANT 374M Sociolinguistics 3 Hours

Explore current interests in sociolinguistic research literature. Examine language and gender; social, regional, and ethnic dialects of American English; language use in African American communities; language and identity in a pluralistic society; and language, literacy, and education.

ANT 376P, 676P Research Internship 3,6 Hours

Supervised fieldwork in a business or community setting related to the student's career and research interests. Students conduct research and apply anthropological skills to real-world problems.

ANT 379 Problems in Anthropology 3 Hours

Supervised individual research on selected problems in anthropology.

ANT 679H Honors Tutorial Course 6 Hours

Individual reading of selected works for one semester, followed in the second semester by the writing of an honors thesis.

ANT 380I, 680I, 980I Professional Internship in Archaeology 3,6,9 Hours

Conduct research and apply archaeological skills to field research, artifact analysis, or management of archaeological records and collections.

ANT 380J Conference Course in Archaeology 3 Hours

Individual instruction in specialized problems of advanced research in archaeology.

ANT 380K Topics in Archaeological Method and Theory 3 Hours

A major category of archaeological topics in which the emphasis is on anthropological theory pertinent to archaeological data and its interpretation.

ANT 380P Professional Practices in Archaeology 3 Hours

Explore a rotating series of themes of central importance to the professional practice of archaeology. ANT 382N Geo-Archaeology and Environmental History 3 Hours

Long-term ecology as reconstructed from settlement and land-use histories. Empirical case studies in environmental history from the Mediterranean region, the Near East, and Mesoamerica. Applications to degradation, desertification, sustainability, and global change.

ANT 383M Topics in Archaeological Techniques and Procedures 3 Hours

A major category of archaeological topics in which the emphasis is on techniques and procedures pertinent to the analysis of prehistoric data.

Various forms of cultural critique, including culture jamming, speed theory, experimental ethnographic writing, posthumanism, postpositivism, and the memoir.

ANT 394M.35 Indigenous Cultural Politics 3 Hours
The worldwide significance of indigenous movements, identities, and cultural forms.

Theories of representation and representational practices, including the representation of collective selves and others in colonial and ethnographic narratives, collections, and displays.

ANT 394M.37 Cultural Analysis: The Case of Class 3 Hours
The development of class analysis in history, sociology, and anthropology, including innovative approaches to the reproduction and performance of class identities.

ANT 394M.38 Cultural Analysis: The Case of Race 3 Hours
Current uses of cultural analysis across a range of disciplines, focusing on how race is accounted for in a variety of invocations of culture.
