GK 601C Beginning Greek 6 Hours

Studies the fundamentals of grammar and reading in ancient Greek.

GK 502 First-Year Modern Greek I 5 Hours

Introduction to grammar and reading.

GK 602C Beginning Modern Greek 6 Hours

GK 503 First-Year Modern Greek II 5 Hours

Continuation of Greek 502.

GK 804 Intensive Beginning Greek 8 Hours

An accelerated course for highly motivated students that combines the material covered in Greek 506 with that covered in the first part of Greek 507.

GK 506 First-Year Greek I 5 Hours

Studies the fundamentals of grammar and reading in ancient Greek.

GK 507 First-Year Greek II 5 Hours

Continuation of Greek 506.

GK 310 Second-Year Modern Greek I 3 Hours

Culture, language, and literature of present-day Greece.

GK 610C Intermediate Modern Greek 6 Hours

Continuation of Greek 602C.

GK 310K Second-Year Modern Greek II 3 Hours

Continuation of Greek 310.

GK 311 Intermediate Greek I 3 Hours

Continuation of Greek 601C or 507. Introductory readings from classical authors such as Lysias, Plato, and Xenophon. Includes grammar review.

GK 412 Intensive Greek 4 Hours

An accelerated course for highly motivated students. Completion of this course is equivalent to completion of Greek 506 and 507. Students who enroll in 412 must take Greek 804 in the same summer session. A grade of A may allow the student to advance to Greek 324 with consent of the Greek 324 instructor.

GK 312K Intermediate Greek II 3 Hours

Continuation of Greek 311. Selected readings from classical and biblical authors.

GK 312L Intermediate Greek II: Biblical Greek 3 Hours

Continuation of Greek 311. A parallel to Greek 312K with a focus on biblical Greek.

GK 119S, 219S, 319S, 419S, 519S, 619S, 719S, 819S, 919S Topics in Greek 1-9 Hours

This course is used to record credit the student earns while enrolled at another institution in a program administered by the University's Study Abroad Office. Credit is recorded as assigned by the study abroad adviser in the Department of Classics. University credit is awarded for work in an exchange program; it may be counted as coursework taken in residence. Transfer credit is awarded for work in an affiliated studies program.
