LAT 601C Beginning Latin 6 Hours
Fundamentals of grammar and reading.

LAT 506 First-Year Latin I 5 Hours
Fundamentals of grammar and reading.

LAT 507 First-Year Latin II 5 Hours
Continuation of Latin 506.

LAT 509L Reading Beginning Latin 5 Hours
Continue exploring beginning-level Latin reading.

LAT 311 Intermediate Latin I 3 Hours
Continuation of Latin 601C and 507. Introduction to reading classical authors in their cultural context. Includes grammar review.

LAT 511K Accelerated Intermediate Latin 5 Hours

LAT 312K Intermediate Latin II 3 Hours
Continuation of Latin 311. Selected readings from classical authors.

LAT 316 Intermediate Latin II: Poetry 3 Hours
Continuation of Latin 311. Selected readings from classical and medieval poets.

This course is used to record credit the student earns while enrolled at another institution in a program administered by the University's Study Abroad Office.
